5 Regulations for Kanazawa University Common Education Courses

(Subject)

Article 1 These Regulations stipulate necessary matters regarding common education courses at Kanazawa University.

(Categories of common education courses)

- Article 2 Courses offered as common education courses (hereinafter "courses") are classified as follows:
 - Introductory courses
 - GS courses
 - GS language courses
 - Basic courses
 - Beginner language courses
 - Electives

(Course and credit acquisition requirements)

- Article 3 The courses and number of credits required are announced at the beginning of the academic year.
- 2 The requirements for taking common education courses are shown in Appendices 1, 2 and 3. However, the requirements for basic courses and beginner language courses shall be determined separately by the schools.

(Open courses)

- Article 4 Courses designated separately as "open courses" can be taken as specialized education courses.
- 2 Open courses can only be taken as either common education or specialized education courses.

(Restrictions on course registration)

- Article 5 The maximum number of credits that can be registered for each semester or quarter is as stipulated in Article 9 of the Kanazawa University Course Regulations (hereinafter "Course Regulations").
- 2 Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding paragraph, the courses listed below are not included in the upper limit of course registration:
 - (1) Courses offered as intensive lectures
 - (2) Courses offered at Ishikawa City College
 - (3) Courses offered at the Open University of Japan
 - (4) Basic courses (Mathematical Statistics A, Mathematical Statistics B, Physics Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory, Earth Science 1A, Earth Science 1B). However, registration for these courses is limited to those who belong to the General Education Department of the Institute of Liberal Arts and Science (limited to those who enrolled through the selection test, which is conducted only for Science students).

 $(Number \ of \ classes \ needed \ for \ credit \ recognition)$

Article 6 As stated in Article 11 No. 2 of the Course Regulations of the Institute of Liberal Arts and Science, the number of classes to be attended shall be two-thirds of the total number of classes. However, for laboratories and seminars, it shall be four-fifths of the total number of classes offered.

(Examination)

- Article 6-2 For each course, the exam is taken at the end of the semester or quarter, although the date may be changed if necessary.
- 2 Depending on the nature of the course, it is possible to replace the exam in the preceding paragraph with grades earned during the semester or quarter.
- 3 Those who meet the requirements of the number of classes to at-

tend and pass the examination specified in the preceding article are given the prescribed credits.

(Evaluation of grades)

- Article 7 Grading criteria are as stipulated in Article 14 of the Course Regulations.
- 2 Courses evaluated as "passed" or "certified" are determined separately.
- 3 Courses for which credit recognition can be withheld are as follows: Introductory courses

GS language courses (Preparation for TOEIC Program) Basic courses

- 4 Criteria for credit recognition deferment and grade evaluation after "on-hold" status is released are determined separately.
 (Comprehensive grade evaluation)
- Article 8 Comprehensive grade evaluation shall be conducted in accordance with Article 15 of the Course Regulations.
- 2 Depending on the GPA of a student, the handling of on-hold or retaken classes shall be determined separately.

(Appeal of grade evaluation)

- Article 9 If a student considers that the grade evaluation is unreasonable in the light of the grade evaluation criteria, they may file an appeal in accordance with the provisions of Article 16 of the Course Regulations.
- 2 The handling of appeals will be determined separately. (Miscellaneous)
- Article 10 Necessary matters other than those mentioned in these Regulations shall be discussed separately.

Supplementary provisions (Abbreviated)

Supplementary provisions

These Regulations shall come into effect on April 1, 2023, and become applicable to students enrolling in the 2023-2024 academic year.
