

9 Kanazawa University Kakuma Campus Vehicle Traffic Regulations

Approved by the Facilities Management Committee
March 26, 2018

(Purpose)

Article 1 In accordance with Article 2, Paragraph 1 (4) of the Kanazawa University Facilities Management Committee Regulations, vehicle traffic regulations shall be enforced on the Kakuma Campus to maintain an environment appropriate for education and research and to prevent traffic accidents.

(Traffic regulations)

Article 2 Traffic regulations shall be as follows

- (1) For the sake of traffic safety and accident prevention, the maximum speed limit on campus roads shall be 20 km/h.
- (2) Slow down at crosswalks, intersections, and curves. Be careful of speed, especially on downhill slopes where acceleration is easy.
- (3) When driving in a parking lot, be careful of pedestrians and parked vehicles, and drive at the slowest speed.
- (4) For the safety of pedestrians, cars and motorcycles are prohibited on the campus road from the Kanazawa University Central Intersection to the General Education Building at all times.

(Entry, parking permits, etc.)

Article 3 Automobiles (excluding bicycles and motorcycles (hereinafter referred to as “two-wheeled vehicles”)) are not permitted to enter the Kakuma Campus. To enter the premises with a parking permit, temporary parking permit, or temporary parking authorization, park in a designated area by putting your parking permit, temporary parking permit, or temporary parking authorization in a place where it can be seen through the windshield. However, during the period from December 1 to March 31 of the following year, the parking permit must be hung from the rearview mirror because the parking permit cannot be seen due to snow accumulation.

2 Two-wheeled vehicles must be parked in designated areas on the Kakuma Campus.

During the winter, two-wheeled vehicles must not be left unattended for long periods of time as they interfere with snow removal.

3 Parking of vehicles without a permit is prohibited in all areas of the campus.

In addition, even for vehicles with permission to enter campus, parking is prohibited outside of parking lots (on prefectural roads, city roads, campus roads, bus stops and their entry and exit points, parking lot entryways, service roads to buildings, etc.).

4 Use of parking lots for purposes other than parking (including reckless behavior, etc.) is prohibited.

(Measures within Academic Zones)

Article 4 Automobiles and two-wheeled vehicles shall not be allowed in the Academic Zones of the departments in order to reduce noise, ensure the safety of pedestrians, and keep from impeding the activities of emergency vehicles.

However, this does not apply to taxis, heavy cargo carriers, vehicles certified as exempt from parking prohibition, and official vehicles.

(Measures during the winter season)

Article 5 During the winter season (when snow accumulates), students shall refrain from riding automobiles and two-wheeled vehicles to school in order to prevent traffic accidents. If you park overnight

(until the next morning) during the winter season to secure a parking space and remove snow, you must park in a designated area (overnight parking area).

(Measures against violating vehicles and violators)

Article 6 The staff and contractors commissioned by the University shall patrol the campus for violating vehicles, record the license plate numbers, etc., and place warning notices and warning poles on the vehicles.

2 Placement of warning notices and warning poles shall be done in accordance with the “Criteria for Placement and Removal of Warning Notices and Warning Poles” specified in the attached document.

3 Parking violations in an Academic Zone may impede the activities of emergency vehicle activities and may result in measures such as forcible removal by tow truck at the offender’s expense without a placement of a warning notice or warning pole.

4 Warning poles are not to be removed for one week after installation. In the event that the scheduled day of removal falls on a holiday, it shall be removed on the next weekday after the holiday.

5 When removing a warning pole, a written letter must be submitted if the offender is a student, and it must be stamped by the student’s Student Life Committee and the advising faculty member. No letter without a stamp will be accepted.

Supplementary Provisions

These Regulations shall come into effect on April 1, 2018.

“Implementation of Traffic Regulations at Kanazawa University Kakuma Campus” is hereby abolished.

Attachment

Criteria for Placement and Removal of Warning Notices and Warning Poles

The placement and removal of warning notices and warning poles for vehicles that violate parking regulations on the Kakuma Campus is as follows.

1. First violation

- A warning notice is posted.
- The vehicle’s license plate number is recorded.

2. Second violation

- A warning notice is posted.
The warning letter states that the next time a violation is committed, the department to which the vehicle’s owner belongs will be notified.
- The vehicle’s license plate number is recorded..

3. Third violation

- A warning notice is posted.
- A warning that a warning pole will be installed the next time a violation occurs.
- The vehicle’s license plate number is recorded.
- If the owner of the vehicle is identified, the Student Affairs or faculty & Staff Affairs department to which the owner belongs will be notified, and a warning will be given.

4. Fourth and subsequent violations

- A notice is posted.

- The vehicle's license plate number is recorded.
- A warning pole is placed.

After the warning pole is placed, it will not be removed it for one week.

Students must obtain the approval of a Student Life Committee member and their advising faculty member (via a written letter, etc.) in order to have the warning pole removed.

Faculty members must obtain approval from the head of their department to have it removed.
